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Best Practice-1 : Enhancing Air Pollution Awareness in Students

Title of Practice

Enhancing Air Pollution Awareness in students

Objectives of the Practice:

The primary objectives of this practice are to educate and sensitize students about air pollution and its impacts and engage the college community in proactive measures to create awareness around air pollution in the students and the local community. The underlying principles are community engagement, and interdisciplinary learning.

The Context:

Since the establishment of Shahid Matangini Hazra Government General Degree College for Women in 2015, the surrounding area has experienced rapid development with numerous construction projects continually underway. This rapid urbanization has led to increased levels of air pollution, posing a significant challenge to the community's health and environment. Recognizing the urgency of addressing this growing concern, all stakeholders, including the college administration, faculty, and students has come together to create awareness about air pollution both within and outside the college. The goal is to foster a deep understanding of air quality issues and promote collective action to mitigate pollution.

The Practice:

The college has implemented a multi-faceted approach to promote air pollution awareness:

Educational Integration: The syllabus of various departments includes topics on air pollution. The inclusion of air pollution in the Environmental Studies syllabus ensures that every student, irrespective of their major, understands the basics and implications of air pollution.

Interactive Sessions and Webinars: The college organizes regular webinars, interactive sessions, and talks featuring experts in the field of air pollution.



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Annual College Magazine: The magazine dedicates sections to environmental issues promoting awareness through articles, essays, and reports by students and faculty. The 2023 issue of the Annual College Magazine was specifically dedicated to women and environment wherein students submitted their insightful take on air pollution.

Campus Events by NSS and Subcommittees: Various events promoting cleanliness and air pollution awareness are organized within the campus. The NSS and other subcommittees like the MNGCRE subcommittee play a pivotal role in these initiatives.

Community Outreach by NSS: Beyond the campus, the NSS conducts awareness drives and events in the surrounding community, educating residents about the importance of air quality, air pollution and how to mitigate pollution.

Annual Air Quality Reports: Annual reports on air quality at the college's pollution monitoring station provide data and insights, guiding further actions and improvements. The 2022 and 2023 annual air quality report provides a detailed analysis of air quality trends and pollutant levels at the college's monitoring station.

Evidence of Success

The success of this practice is evident through various indicators:

- Increased student participation in environmental activities and projects including study of the Air Quality Report.
- Enhanced community engagement, with local residents participating in NSS-led initiatives.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required

Implementing this practice faced several challenges:

Resource Constraints: Limited financial and human resources sometimes hindered the scale and frequency of activities.

Technical Challenges: Monitoring and reporting air quality required technical expertise and equipment, which were occasionally difficult to procure.

To sustain and expand these initiatives, ongoing support from the college administration, collaboration with external agencies, and continuous funding are essential.


**REPORT ON VIRTUAL LECTURE

The program was coordinated by Smt. Sayanwita Panja, Asst. Professor, Dept. of Chemistry.


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

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State Level Webinar on 'Cries Behind the Closed Rooms- Covid 19, Domestic Violence and Mental Health' On 25.09.2020

Short Report of the Webinar

Dr. Nilanjana Bagchi, Associate Professor and Head of the Department of Psychology at Bethune College, Kolkata, West Bengal was invited as a resource person on 25.09.2020 for a state level webinar on 'Cries Behind the Closed Rooms- Covid 19, Domestic Violence and Mental Health'. The webinar was organized by the Department of Political Science in collaboration with IQAC of the college. The principal of the college, 23 faculties and 100 students of the college attended the webinar. Dr Bagchi spoke on several important gendered issues of the society in light of the then ongoing pandemic.

Dr Bagchi argued how COVID-19 pandemic had brought about unprecedented changes in our daily lives, and one of the most significant impacts was on domestic violence. With lockdowns and quarantine measures in place, victims of domestic violence found themselves trapped with their abusers, leading to an increase in reported cases of domestic violence. She mentioned how World Health Organization (WHO) reported a significant increase in the number of calls to domestic violence hotlines in countries affected by the pandemic. This was not only a physical issue but also a mental health issue as the prolonged stress and isolation led to long-term mental health problems for mostly female victims. In addition to physical abuse, domestic violence also included emotional and psychological abuse, which can be just as damaging.

The isolation and lack of social support during the pandemic made it even harder for female victims to seek help. Dr Bagchi stressed on how Mental health professionals expressed concern about the negative effects of prolonged stress and isolation on victims of domestic violence. The trauma of domestic violence led to depression, anxiety, and post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), all of which had long-term effects on a person's mental health. The government and civil society organizations took steps to address the issue of domestic violence during the pandemic. Many countries set up hotlines and online resources for victims to seek help and support. She concluded by saying how the COVID-19 pandemic brought a new dimension to the issue of domestic violence and how it was essential to recognize the problem, provide support and resources to victims, and work towards creating a society where domestic violence was not tolerated. Her talk was followed by an interaction session with our students and faculties where Dr. Bagchi shared useful resources and helpline numbers across West Bengal that could provide help to victims of violence.

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


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Short Report of the Webinar

On 11th November 2021, a training session was conducted on 'Standing Up Against Street Harassment- How to use 5Ds to stop street Harassment', in partnership with Breakthrough Trust, Hollaback Foundation, and L'Oréal Paris', for the students of the college. The training was organized by the Seminar, Publication and Academic Calendar Committee. The principal, committee members and around 400 students of the college were in attendance. The training session was led by Bisma Javed, Gender Sensitive certified trainer from Hollaback Foundation. Ms. Javed has done Bachelors in Sociology and Masters in Gender Studies from Jamia Millia Islamia. She is associated with Breakthrough since 2019. She was awarded with the "Rising Woman Award 2021" on the occasion of International Women's Day. She has also recently represented India in Asia-Pacific Generation Equality Dialogue - Youth Activism Accelerator organized by UN Women. She is actively involved in training students on how to safely intervene if they witness street harassment and how to protect themselves in such situations. She also writes on gender-sensitive topics through short columns and digital art pages on social media platforms. Bisma Javed discussed with the students how Street harassment is a growing issue that affects many women and can take many forms, from cat-calling and staring to being followed on the street. This can be a traumatic experience, and it is important to have strategies in place to deal with it.

The session was divided into two parts, with the first focusing on how to save someone from street harassment, and the second focusing on how to deal with street harassment when it affects the individual. The main goal of the session was to raise awareness and provide an intervention strategy for our female students, ultimately leading to a safer space for women and girls. Javed shared the 5D formula for dealing with street harassment: Distract, Delegate, Document, Delay, and Direct. She explained that the first D, Distract, involves taking an indirect approach to de-escalate the situation, while the second D, Delegate, involves seeking help from the nearest authority if safety is compromised. The third D, Document, is important for providing evidence if needed, but it should not be the only action taken. The fourth D, Delay, involves checking in with the harassed person after the incident, and the last D, Direct, involves assessing safety and speaking up about the harassment. Javed emphasized the importance of being a good bystander and assessing which of the 5Ds is the best option in each situation. Javed also addressed how to deal with street harassment when it affects the individual. She advised that individuals should trust their instincts, reclaim their space, and practice resilience. She explained that there is no right or perfect response to harassment, but that responding can reduce the trauma associated. She also emphasized the importance of documenting the situation and taking care of oneself after the incident

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


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Report of the Event

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
